

I joined the Air Training Corps in 1982 when I was asked by a couple of school friends, who were cadet SNCOs, if I would come and help them out with adventure training. The thought of shooting never entered my head; it wasn't an activity I'd ever been exposed to as I was then a keen climber and hill-walker.

I progressed through to adult service and was commissioned into the RAFVR(T) in 1986. I still wasn't shooting orientated. In 1988 I took command of my first Squadron and then met a gentleman who became a massive influence in my life. My Squadron Warrant Officer was a former Duke of Wellington's Regiment Sergeant Major and he was a shooter. By way of gentle persuasion, thinly veiled threats and leading by example he beguiled me into the world of shooting. After a few range days I followed the siren song of gun fire and I was hooked.

I was persuaded to enrol on a range course and then a coaching course and then a I think you know how this is going to turn out. Slowly but surely I found myself doing more shooting activities than adventure training activities. With the help of WO Wilkinson I had become an evangelistic shooter. I had seen the light.

I was hungry to learn more about this fantastic sport. Wilko introduced me to civilian shooting and soon I was a member of a local club and the proud owner of a couple of target rifles. I never really hit any great heights as a shooter but I did represent my county of Nottinghamshire and the RAF Reserves at small-bore.

I progressed in the ATC running sector shoots and became Wing team manager for teams at CISSAM and ISCRM. It was at ISCRM where I became hooked on full-bore target rifle shooting; I was mesmerised by the science of coaching. I greatly enjoyed the sportsmanship and the camaraderie; I had found my niche. Whilst Wing Shooting Officer I moved behind the firing line to become a Range Conducting Officer. I've now been RCOing ISCRM and Schools' meetings for around 6 years and more recently the Imperial.

I visited Canada for the first time in 1991 when I spent a couple of weeks in Alberta and visited just about every cadet unit in the province. I was mightily impressed by the ethos out there and the professionalism and friendliness of the cadet adults.

I shall be proud to be working alongside our Canadian friends; they have excellent cadet forces and dedicated staff. They will be worthy opponents and I look forward to us forging long-lasting friendships with our Canadian colleagues.

I dedicate this tour to my wife Julie who has been a shooting widow for the best part of our married life; thank you for letting me attend. And also to Warrant Officer John Wilkinson – Wilko – who started me off on my shooting career; sadly he is no longer with us.

Shooting for Eilidh is something of a family affair. Before she even knew about the sport (at around six years old) her Dad had plans to get her and her brothers to come and experience the joy of Bisley. During her first trip in 2005 she shot for Dollar Academy, helping them to win 'The Ashburton' for the first time. What struck Eilidh during her first visit to Bisley was what a lovely group of people were involved in the sport. People who had toured together stayed in touch, and the Dollar caravan was always a hub of activity with people popping in for a tea or coffee as well as some helpful shooting advice. Council for Cadet Rifle Shooting

My name is Robert Bruce and I took over as General Secretary of the Council for Cadet Rifle Shooting (CCRS) in November 2016. I was a career infantry officer in the British Army but have never been involved in target rifle shooting.

CCRS is a registered charity which was formed in 1969 from a number of cadet associations. The purpose of CCRS is to promote and encourage competition shooting across all 4 cadet youth movements in order to help young people to develop their characters including a sense of social responsibility. CCRS has entered into a Memorandum of Understanding with the UK Ministry of Defence to enable the charity to work in partnership with the cadet youth movements. The charity delivers a wide range of activities including: training coaches, running postal shoots and organising national competitons across all shooting disciplines. The culmination of UK cadet full-bore shooting takes place annually at Bisley; this is conducted over a 3 week period and involves around 1500 cadets from all 4 youth organisations.

CCRS is also responsible for 3 international teams which compete annually - the UK Cadet Rifle Team (U17) competes in the Channel Islands, the British Cadet Rifle Team (U18 and known as The Athelings) competes in Canada and the GB U19 Rifle Team competes in South Africa. These teams are the pinnacle of excellence to which cadets aspire and CCRS is honoured to be associated with all 3.

Upon leaving cadets young shooters are ideally prepared to advance their experiences by challenging for places in UK senior teams. It is worth noting, in that respect, that 25 of the 26 members of the 2019 GB (Long Range) Palma Rifle Team were former members of the cadet forces.

Turning now to the UK/Canada exchanges and the British Cadet Rifle Team U18 (The Athelings) in particular. The first exchange of cadet teams between UK and Canada took place in 1910, fostered by the Imperial Cadet Association, one of the forerunners of CCRS. The association was founded to create and maintain links between the cadet organisations in the mother country, dominions and colonies. In 1928 2 officers and 12 cadets took part in the annual meeting at Connaught and the format of the modern Athelings' tour was born.

The Chairman, and all members of CCRS, send their best wishes to the 2019 Athelings and wish them every success in their competitions at Connaught ranges.
