Part 1 – Nat CARM General Rules

Reference:

- A. Cadet Training – Ranges. Regulations for Training with Cadet Weapon Systems and Pyrotechnics (2018)
- B. Army Code 72195 – .177” Air Rifles and Associated Equipment 2022 (Mar 25 - Amdt 4)
- C. The NSRA 3P Air Rifle & Sporter Air Rifle Rules (2013)

Rules

G1. These rules are to be observed in the spirit as well as the letter and are intended to be supplementary to Reference A.

G2. The Exercise Director, Senior Planning Officer (SPO) or RCO is empowered to stop shooting at any time during the meeting should they consider that circumstances including the weather conditions warrant it. CCRS's designated committee as appointed by CCRS's trustees (normally the Inter Services Matches Committee with appropriate representation from CCRS) is empowered to alter the programme, including the cancellation of matches, should circumstances make it necessary. The following personnel are recognised as permanent range staff on the range, who may fulfil any range duties they are qualified for:

- a. A Range Conducting Officer (RCO) who will be in overall charge of the range.
- b. A Senior Safety Supervisor, who will be the RCOs deputy.
- c. Safety Supervisors, who are responsible for the safe running of a group of targets. Each group of targets will have one or two safety supervisors.
- d. A qualified first aid CFAV for the range, who will not be assigned to any other duty.
- e. Ammunition CFAVs who will be responsible for managing the ammunition, issuing to teams, collecting unfired sighters and completed scorecards.
- f. NSRA Range Management staff who will be responsible for the management of the NSRA electronic targets and scoring systems.

G3. Protests must be actioned by the team coach in accordance with para G18. Any dispute which cannot immediately be resolved by the safety supervisor must be referred to the RCO without delay. If the protest is still unresolved, then the process and timings detailed in para G18 must be followed. The protest committee consists of:

- a. The Exercise Director or the Chair of the appropriate CCRS Committee.
- b. A minimum of one representative from each Service.

- c. One of:
 - (1) CCRS's Shooting Manager.
 - (2) CCRS's Competitions Officer.
- d. The RCO or their deputy, who should explain the reason and background behind the protest without mentioning the name of the unit or firer.

Safety

G4. AR drills are to be followed at all times in accordance with Reference B. A cadet or CFAV who has an unintended discharge through an error of drill will render their WHT void and must receive instruction and a retest before they may fire again, and their score in the match in which the incident took place will be void.

G5. As part of the end of practice drills:

- a. The firer unloads as per specific rifles drills.
- b. Safety Supervisor clears the rifle.
- c. CFAV (Team Manager) opens the bolt and inserts the safety line into the barrel fully.

Eligibility

G6. Firing teams are to consist of the following, all of whom must hold a valid WHT:

- a. A named team manager, who must be a CFAV but does not need to be the coach. The team manager may cover for more than one team.
- b. A coach, who may be any CFAV or cadet with suitable experience.
- c. Four cadet firers, who must be from the same CCF Contingent, SCC Area, ACF County or RAFAC Wing. They must be under 18 on the day of any competition they compete in.
- d. An optional fifth cadet, who, if eligible under (c), may substitute for one of the four firers in a team. Any substitution of a firer must be authorised in writing by the appropriate Committee prior to the start of shooting. If time is short, the RCO will give provisional permission pending authorisation from the Committee.
- e. One or more supernumeraries to assist on the range (eg team adjutant) who may be CFAV or cadets.

Rifles and Ammunition

G7. The sS approved sporter Air Rifle (BSA Scorpion or Air Arms S200) with no modifications must be used in accordance with Reference B. It must have a suitable safety line.

G8. Only ammunition issued at the meeting may be used. Ammunition will be issued immediately before the start of the practice and is not to be taken behind the firing point. Unused pellets are to be returned to the ammunition point at the end of the shoot.

Dress and Equipment

G9. The following dress standards are to be observed:

- a. Firers when on the firing point:
 - (1) Uniform is to be of service pattern and as issued. Badges of rank must be worn.
 - (2) Belts need not be worn.
 - (3) An eye patch or blinder may be used.
 - (4) A plain, regimental, or single service HQ authorised cap of the appropriate service colour may be worn.
 - (5) Prescription spectacles, eyeglasses (not including shooting glasses), or contact lenses are to be worn in accordance with Ref A. Corrective lenses or filters may not be attached to the rifle.
- b. CFAV and Cadets on the range, including range staff, should dress according to the conditions.
- c. When off, or transiting to and from the range, CFAV and Cadets should wear uniform appropriate to their Service, including berets.

G10. All firers must set up between the lane markers for the target space. Teams may only use the chairs behind their lane.

Hearing and Eye Protection

G11. The use of issued ear defenders on the firing point and when forward of a line marked by the rear edge of the ammunition issuing tables is mandatory. Where ear defenders are required to be worn berets are to be removed.

G12. Safety glasses are to be worn on the firing point, by cadets and CFAV.

Ties and Targets

G13. Ties for first place in individual competitions will, unless otherwise stated in the match conditions, be determined by a tie shoot in accordance with Reference C.

G14. Targets are as detailed for each match in the match conditions. They may be substituted with as close an equivalent as possible should the ISSF electronic targets not be available.

Challenges and Protests

G15. The individual shot scores from the electronic targets cannot be contested.

G16. Protests on the procedure of a shoot (eg timings, target breakages, target moving as the shot is fired etc) must be made to a safety supervisor by the coach or team captain, preferably before the score is known. If upheld, the score made will be annulled and another pellet will be issued with the score

from the issued pellet replacing that of the protested shot. If the protest is not upheld the score made will be taken.

G17. The RCO, their deputy or, if immediately available, a member of CCRS may take any appropriate action which, if it affects the score, must then be referred to the Protest Committee who will then either accept or reject the action and adjust the score accordingly.

G18. The following procedure must be followed in order for a protest to be considered:

- a. The coach must request the presence of the RCO or their deputy who will make an initial decision.
- b. If the decision of the RCO or their deputy is not accepted, a written protest must be lodged with the RCO within 20 minutes of the end of the detail, with contact details and a basic summary of the protest.
- c. The RCO, on receipt of a written protest, will call a Protest Committee who will hear the protest without undue delay and make a decision, which will be final.

G19. The RCO or a safety supervisor may allow an extra sighting shot for the following reasons:

- a. Delays of over five minutes outside the firer's control.
- b. Where firer has to change targets after commencing their shoot. They will get an additional 5 mins plus the remain time to complete their shoot and any sighter they require.
- c. Where it is considered by the RCO or safety supervisor that an extra sighting shot is appropriate.

Extra sighting shots are not convertible and are not recorded on the register card.

Part 2 – Nat CARM Competition Procedures

- P1. **General.** Each period in Nat CARM will consist of unlimited sighters followed by 20 shots to count from the standing position.
- P2. **Firing point set up.** When allowed by the RCO, teams are to set up on their allocated lane. All members of the team and their equipment must be wholly within an area bounded by a line perpendicular to the lane either side extending down to the edge of the firing point.
- P3. **Firing Order.** Teams must fire in the order on the register cards.
- P4. **Timings.** Each team of four firers will be allocated a lane; each firer will be allocated their detail. The following timings will apply for all matches, less Match 3:
- a. **Sighting shots 5 mins.**
 - b. **20 scored shots 30 mins.**
- P5. Teams of less than four firers may shoot in team competitions but only individual scores will be recorded.
- P6. Timings for Match 3 are as laid down in Part 3.
- P7. The RCO at their discretion may allow extra time for events outside a team's control. Any shots fired after the time limit, where the RCO has not allowed extra time, shall be annulled.
- P8. **Scoring.** The standard NSRA targets and scoring shall be used. Targets are inward gauging.
